As you know, students attended Belmont Secondary School in the morning studying Social Studies 10 with their teacher, Ms. Spaulding. After their studies, they participated in cultural, educational and recreational activities. They even joined up with the B.C. teachers for a field trip to the City of Vancouver. From my perspective, I believe the students grew in confidence, developed a more global view of the world and improved their communication skills in English.

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#### **Campus** Tours

Students visited four different college and university campuses to get an idea of opportunities for possible postsecondary studies in BC. They visited UBC, UVic, Camosun College, and Royal Roads University. There they were able to get a sense of university life in Canada.

## **Indigenous and First Nations**

As a part of Social Studies 10 students were introduced to the history and consequences of the colonization of Canada by Europeans including the cultural and linguistic genocide of indigenous peoples. They studied the related government policies and Residential schools as well as about current attempts at reconciliation.





Another part of Social Studies 10 was familiarizing students with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Students made posters for each of the 30 Articles which have been made available in over 500 languages and serve "as a common standard of achievements for all peoples and all nations."

# Science & Math

In Science 10, students have recently completed the chemistry unit and have started biology. Students performed well in chemistry and have improved in analyzing experimental data and in using various laboratory skills to conduct experiments. In biology, students will study genetics with a focus on patterns of inheritance and generic engineering. Students began the unit by looking at DNA structure and function and got a chance to make their own origami DNA model.

In Math 10, students recently finished their first math project as part of the polynomials unit. Students had to design a house floor plan then calculate the area of each room using polynomial expressions. All the designs were creative, and everyone worked hard to finish on time. Over the next few weeks, we will be studying functions and relations. Students will be using different graphing techniques in order to explore the relationships between different sets of data.

# English Language Arts

In ELA this term, our big focus is on writing about our thinking, analyses, and opinions. Students have begun to learn skills and structures to help refine their essay writing, such as how to write a strong topic sentence and introductory paragraph. Since April, students have been working on developing an opinion essay analyzing the theme of a short film we watched, and have been revising and editing it as we evolve our writing processes and practices. A new addition to the classroom this term is a Reading-Writing Workshop every Friday to promote the material of the new OGCIS library and provide students with class time to explore and develop an enjoyment of reading and thinking about reading. Later on in the term, we plan to start going into the intricacies of citation and the danger of plagiarism when we use evidence to support our writing.





## **OGCIS LIBRARY**

Fall is the season of reading in Japan. Starting in term 2 students will be able to access a variety of English-language novels and graphic novels through the OGCIS library. They can browse titles, check availability, and even request books through their Surface Go or smartphones. Students can also access our library through the link in the sidebar of the OGCIS homepage.
